Reading is probably the most important skill for second language (L2) learners in academic contexts (Celce and Murcia, 2001). Reading is gradually being recognize as a valuable source of language input, particularly for students in learning environments (as in some EFL context) in which fluent speakers of English are generally not available to provide other kinds of language input.

In educational settings, reading comprehension is often emphasized and assessed to evaluate students' understanding and learning. Effective reading instruction focuses not only on decoding skills but also on strategies to enhance comprehension, such as predicting, summarizing, questioning, and making connections.
